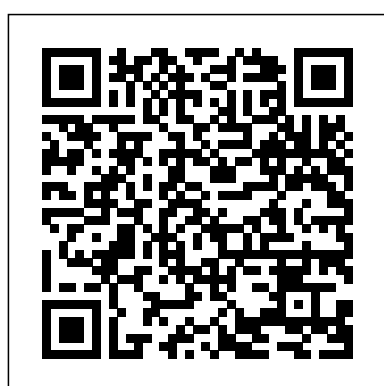

Prohibition has long been portrayed as a " noble experiment " that failed, a newsreel story of glamorous gangsters, flappers, and speakeasies. Now at last Lisa

The effect is dazzling, making for one of the freshest debut in years: a comedy, a tearjerker, a mystery story, a novel of exceptional literary merit that is great fun to

With a compelling cast of humans and animals, this moving book is a must read for all dog lovers—military and otherwise.
