We also assume that voters consider candidates' competence, honesty, and other performance-related traits. But does this actually happen? Do voters consider candidates ' policy positions when deciding for whom to vote? And how do politicians ' performances in office factor into the voting decision? In Follow the Leader?, Gabriel S. In fact, Lenz shows, the reverse often takes place: citizens first pick a politician and then adopt that politician 's policy views. In other words, they follow the leader.
