On March 1, 1966, the voters of Tucson approved the Pueblo Center Redevelopment Project–Arizona’s first major urban renewal project–which targeted the most densely populated eighty acres in the state. La Calle explores the forces behind the mass displacement: an unrelenting desire for order, a local economy increasingly dependent on tourism, and the pivotal power of federal housing policies. To understand how urban renewal resulted in the spatial reconfiguration of downtown Tucson, Otero draws on scholarship from a wide range of disciplines: Chicana/o, ethnic, and cultural studies; urban history, sociology, and anthropology; city planning; and cultural and feminist geography.
