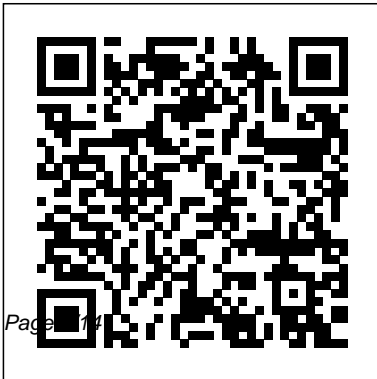

The Light At End John Skipp

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Matthew Henry's Commentary on the Whole Bible: Volume V-III - John University of Toronto Press

King of Light is the title of a series that entail: Book of Genesis Part I (the Creation of the World), Book of John Part I (the Path of the Ministry of the Gospel), and Book of John Part II (the Path of the Cross). They go through the books of the Bible (Genesis chapters 1-9, and John) providing commentary verse-by-verse, in light of God's new era, the Era of Love or "Sarang Shi Dae" in Korean. (Sarang Shi Dae literally translates to "Love Era" or "Love Epoch"). King of Light: the Book of John Part 1 and Part 2 take us through the footsteps of Jesus during His ministry, revealing His work, words and mission, which ultimately led to the slaughter but certainly didn't end there. This book, King of Light: Book of John Part II: The Path of the Cross, covers chapters 10-21 of the Gospel according to John, and takes us through each chapter that beautifully and poignantly reveals the movement of Jesus, starting from the time of His appearance in John 1. By taking a look at the "First

Coming" of Jesus with the spiritually opened Word of the Era of Love, we can discover the spiritually cataclysmic shift that happened from one era to another, and know that another similar shift is in the making. Many believers will know that when Jesus came to this earth in the flesh, "He came to his own, and those who were his own didn't receive him" (John 1:11). King of Light: The Book of John shows that this was the marker of time in which the Gospel, and no longer the Law, was "the light". The Law was "the light" during its time as the light, but when the one who brought completion to the Law arrived at the scene, there were those in the Law who "didn't recognize him" (John 1:10). Nevertheless, Jesus was the Messiah and fulfilled and brought completion to what we see as the Old Testament, that is, the Law, in which animal sacrifices were offered so that God's direct connection with man could be made. Jesus on the cross was the final sacrifice, and it brought down the curtain of the Law (Matt. 27:51, Acts 17:24). After Jesus' arrival, those who received Him as Truth could

make a direct connection with God through Jesus. It wasn't until He resurrected and ascended, that afterwards the Holy Spirit, the same Holy Spirit in Him during His ministry on earth, came upon Mark's Upper Room and rested inside the disciples and in those who would proclaim "the Good News". Now, the time of Christ's return is not only more imminent than before, but the meaning and significance of a "return" must be tore open to expose the "the Even Better News" that it really is (see Lee's books the Food for the Era of Love series.) This is significant because it reveals how God desires to tear open another curtain, the curtain of the literal Word as well as the veil over our eyes, thus exposing another "shift" that's analogous to Christ's "First Coming". The Spirit of His Second Coming rests upon this earth, and goes in search of those who receive the Word opened in the Spirit. The time of Christ's First Coming can be seen as a parallel to the Era of Love, that is, the Second Coming. Just as, at the time of the First Coming, the Word became flesh and went to His own, in the Second Coming, that which fulfills and brings completion to the Gospel first arrives as the Word in the Spirit. The Era of Love is when that which fulfills and brings completion to the Gospel (and ultimately to Scripture as a whole) arrives and moves in the Spirit as Love. The arrival isn't a physical one (in the way of certain popular imaginations) but initially, a spiritual one as the Word—that is, the Word opened in the Spirit. *This book includes a special, short testimony by Young-Rock's daughter, Heeseung Lee, who briefly shares her journey from South Korea to the U.S., having received God's mission for her to send the Era of Love to the various people she met during her time in the U.S. **Scripture quotes from WEB, in public domain.

especially its vital role in their gradual transformation into the likeness or image of Christ.

John Bramblitt makes his living as a visual
artist. His works have been sold in over

He now paints amazingly lifelike portraits of people he's never seen--including his wife and son. *Shouting in the Dark* is the story of Bramblitt's life, his journey navigating through this new territory of blindness, and how he ultimately rekindles his joy, passion, and relationships through art.

Life of John Stuart Mill Bantam

M.F. Sadler was an Anglican priest. He served as rector of Honiton, England,

and wrote several other commentaries, including volumes on each of the four Gospels. SADLER, MICHAEL FERREBEE (1819-1895), theologian, eldest son of Michael Thomas Sadler [q. v.], was born at Leeds in 1819. Educated at Sherborne school, he entered St. John's College, Cambridge, after a short interval of business life. He was elected Tyrwhitt's Hebrew scholar in 1846, and graduated B.A. 1847. He was vicar of Bridgwater from 1857 to 1864 (during which time he was appointed to the prebend of Combe, 13th in Wells Cathedral), and of St. Paul's, Bedford, from 1864 to 1869; he was rector of Honiton from 1869 till his death. In 1869 he received an offer of

the bishopric of Montreal, carrying with it the dignity of metropolitan of Canada, but refused it on medical advice. He was a voluminous writer on theological subjects, and a strong high churchman. His works, which had a large circulation, did much to popularise the tractarian doctrines.

One of the core messages of *Sarang Shi Dae* (Era of Love, or, the time of the Second Coming) is that bodies don't actually rise out of graves during the Last Days. In other words, the Book of Revelation and "End Times" prophecies

are mainly not meant to be taken literally. They are allegorical expressions of the spiritual phenomenon in man during a time of God's greatest finishing-up of Scripture. This text (the words of the Era of Love "Sarang Shi Dae") is a complete text in that it spiritually opens the deep secrets of Jesus and the cross. Through this text, one can see God's astonishing will and plan with spiritual eyes. Our hope as believers is the meeting of the Second Coming, and this happens by the Word. When we lay ourselves down and open the eyes of our spirit, we can meet God.*
