Perhaps because major Victorians like Thomas Carlyle and Matthew Arnold proscribed Romantic melancholy as morbidly diseased and unsuitable for poetic expression, critics have neglected or understated the central importance of melancholy in Victorian poetry. *Allegories of One's Own Mind* re-directs our attention to a mode that Arnold was rejecting as morbid but also acknowledging when he disparaged the widely current idea that the highest ambition of poetry should be to present an allegory of the poet's own mind. This book shows how early Victorian poets suffered from and railed against what they perceived to be a "disabling post-Wordsworthian melancholy"-we might refer to it as depression-and yet benefited from this self-absorbed or love-obsessed state, which ironically made them more productive. Such ambivalence, in fact, is in itself constitutive of melancholy, long understood as the product of conscience raging against inchoate desire, and it constitutes the mood of the age's most important poetry, represented here in the major works of Alfred Tennyson, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, and even in the notoriously "optimistic" Robert Browning. Proceeding to the larger problem of establishing a Malaysian nation, he analyzes the forces promoting unity and disunity. Surveying Malaysia's economic progress, the author notes its dependence on the United States, the biggest buyer of Malaysia's rubber and tin, and he projects sustained economic growth. He then discusses Malaysia's regional and international relations, outlining those factors that influence its foreign policy. Concluding with a perceptive interpretation of the United States's connection to the area, he highlights the long history of friendship; the economic interdependence; the American commitment to help Malaysia maintain its

political independence and further develop its viable economy; and recent aid and political relations.

Dundee had an interesting role to play in
the jute trade, but the main player in the
story of jute was Calcutta. This book
follows the relationship of jute to empire,
and discusses the rivalry between the

Scottish and Indian cities from the 1840s to
the 1950s and reveals the architecture of
jute's place in the British Empire. The book
adopts significant fresh approaches to
imperial history, and explores the economic
and cultural landscapes of the British
Empire. Jute had been grown, spun and woven
in Bengal for centuries before it made its
appearance as a factory-manufactured product
in world markets in the late 1830s. The book
discusses the profits made in Calcutta
during the rise of jute between the 1880s
and 1920s; the profits reached extraordinary
levels during and after World War I. The
Calcutta jute industry entered a crisis
period even before it was pummelled by the
depression of the 1930s. The looming crisis
stemmed from the potential of the Calcutta
mills to outproduce world demand many times
over. The St Andrew's Day rituals in
Calcutta, begun three years before the
founding of the Indian Jute Mills
Association. The ceremonial occasion helps
the reader to understand what the jute
wallahs meant when they said they were in
Calcutta for 'the greater glory of
Scotland'. The book sheds some light on the
contentious issues surrounding the

problematic, if ever-intriguing, phenomenon of British Empire. The jute wallahs were inextricably bound up in the cultural self-images generated by British imperial ideology.

Volume 19 is dedicated to the memory of Prof Lothar Fietz (University of Tübingen) in appreciation of his merits as an outstanding Huxley scholar, as a Founding Member and Curator of the Aldous Huxley Society and as a true friend (see the In Memoriam above). This section is followed by Huxley's draft for an introduction of Edna St. Vincent Millay at one of her poetry readings in 1938 and an autograph letter to Seabury Edwardes that he wrote shortly after the publication of *The Doors of Perception* (1954). The volume closes with several critical articles on Huxley's relationship with D. T. Suzuki, his Sanary period and his view and practice of literary utopias.
