The Ethics of Aristotle: The Nicomachean Ethics ...

For Aristotle, this happiness is our highest goal. However, Aristotle does not say that we should aim at happiness, but rather that we do aim at happiness. His goal in the Ethics is not to tell us that we ought to live happy, successful lives, but to tell us what this life consists of. Most people think of happiness as physical pleasure or honor, but this is because they have an imperfect

view of the good life.

Aristotle wrote two ethical treatises: the Nicomachean Ethics and the Eudemian Ethics. He does not himself use either of these titles, although in the Politics (1295a36) he refers back to one of them—probably the Eudemian Ethics—as “ ta ê thika ” —his writings about character.

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The Nicomachean Ethics In his ethical treatises Aristotle offers a defense of the idea of eudaimonism (human flourishing or happiness) which is achieved as a result of human choice in search of excellence and the good life.

Happiness, therefore, is our greatest mission. Supposing this to be our aim, Aristotle then proceeds in his *Nicomachean Ethics* to figure out how best to achieve this goal. Aristotle starts with the claim that happiness is dependent on virtue. He describes virtue as a disposition, rather than an activity.
