### English Lit Macmillan

Nestled between the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, and stretching from Hampton Roads to Assateague Island, Virginia's Eastern Shore is a distinctly southern place with an exceptionally southern taste. In this inviting narrative, Bernard L. Herman welcomes readers into the communities, stories, and flavors that season a land where the distance from tide to tide is often less than five miles. Blending personal observation, history, memories of harvests and feasts, and recipes, Herman tells of life along the Eastern Shore through the eyes of its growers, watermen, oyster and clam farmers, foragers, church cooks, restaurant owners, and everyday residents. Herman reveals this resilience through the recipes and celebrations that hold meaning, not just for those who live there but for all those folks who sit at their tables — and other tables near and far.

We tend to suppose that the ancient Greeks had primitive ideas of the self, of responsibility, freedom, and shame, and that now humanity has advanced from these to a more refined moral consciousness. While we are in many ways different from the Greeks, Williams claims that the differences are not to be traced to a shift in these basic conceptions of ethical life. We are more like the ancients than we are prepared to acknowledge, and only when this is understood can we properly grasp our most important differences from them, such as our rejection of slavery. The author is a philosopher, but much of his book is directed to writers such as Homer and the tragedians, whom he discusses as poets and not just as materials for philosophy. At the center of his study is the question of how we can understand Greek tragedy at all, when its world is so far from ours. Williams explains how it is that when the ancients speak, they do not merely tell us about themselves, but about ourselves. In a new foreword A.A. Long explores the impact of this volume in the context of Williams's stunning career. Anton the Dove Fancier and Other Tales of the Holocaust Henry Holt and Company (BYR)

The Sharpe book applies classical statistical testing procedures to the problem of measuring the performance of financial assets. The statistical properties of the Sharpe ratio are thoroughly explored, for Gaussian returns via the connection to Student's t statistic, and asymptotically. The effects of heteroskedasticity, autocorrelation, fat tails and skew of returns are considered. Portfolio optimization with the objective of maximizing the Sharpe ratio is studied. Inference on the Markowitz portfolio, and its signal-noise ratio, are explored via the connection to Hotelling's T2 statistic. Portfolio subspace and hedging constraints, the use of conditioning information, and overfitting and overoptimism are given thorough treatment. Inference is considered via Frequentist, Likelihood and Bayesian paradigms.
