mile Zola was the leader of the literary movement known as 'naturalism' and is one of the great figures of the novel. In his monumental *Les Rougon-Macquart* (1871-93), he explored the social and cultural landscape of the late nineteenth century in ways that scandalized bourgeois society. Zola opened the novel up to a new realm of subjects, including the realities of working-class life, class relations, and questions of gender and sexuality, and his writing
