Between 1910 and 1918 he produced 82 short stories for *Cosmopolitan*. 'The Exploits of Elaine' was Reeves first screenplay, and by the end of the decade, his film career was at its peak with his name appearing on seven films, most of them serials and three of them starring Harry Houdini.
