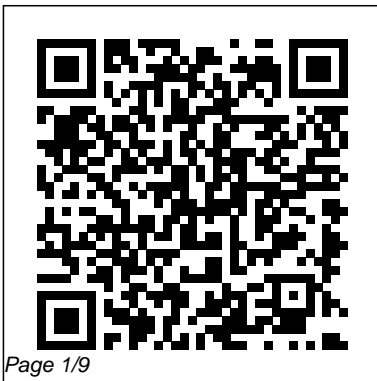

prolific writing life. Wise, self-deprecating and bristling with incident, this is a first-class memoir.
