chase these high ideas. But first, Henry had to answer up for leaving Idaho. Henry ' s dearest friend and intellectual sparring partner, Pastor Will Webb, and Henry ' s two adult sons, Thomas and Harvey, were baffled and angry that he would abandon them and move to the Deep South, living in a barn there while he built a round house of handmade concrete blocks. His new neighbors were perplexed by his eccentric behavior as well. On the coldest day of winter he was barefoot, a philosopher and poet with ideas and words to share with anyone

who would listen. And, mysteriously, his “ last few months ” became years. He had gone looking for a place to learn lessons in dying, and, studiously advanced to claim a vigorous new life.
