Keats ' s first volume of poems, published in 1817, demonstrated both his belief in the consummate power of poetry and his liberal views. While he was criticized by many for his politics, his immediate circle of friends and family immediately recognized his genius. In his short life he proved to be one of the greatest and most original thinkers of the second generation of Romantic poets, with such poems as ' Ode to a Nightingale ' , ' On First Looking into Chapman ' s Homer ' and ' La Belle Dame sans Merci ' . While his writing is illuminated by his exaltation of the imagination and abounds with sensuous descriptions of nature ' s beauty, it also explores profound philosophical questions. "Hyperion" is an epic poem by 19th-century English Romantic poet John Keats. It is based on the Titanomachia, and tells of the despair of the Titans after their fall to the Olympians. Keats wrote the poem from late 1818 until the spring of 1819, when he gave it up as having "too many Miltonic

inversions." The themes and ideas were picked up again in Keats's *The Fall of Hyperion: A Dream*, when he attempted to recast the epic by framing it with a personal quest to find truth and understanding. John Keats (1795 - 1821) was an English Romantic poet. The poetry of Keats is characterized by sensual imagery, most notably in the series of odes. Today his poems and letters are some of the most popular and most analyzed in English literature.

The voluminous illustrative appendices are not given; but so much of their substance as is necessary for general use is extracted and distributed under other heads; and in all essential matters this edition is the Library edition brought up to date. The principles of editorship are thus the same as in my large edition of Shelley in eight volumes. The plan has been to

gather together everything which could be found from the hand of the poet, to establish the text as nearly as possible in accordance with what he wrote or meant to write, to make no changes without record, to set out fully in foot-notes all authoritative variations of text, rejected passages, &c., and to elucidate and illustrate from such printed and manuscript sources as were open to me. Despite dying in Rome in 1821, at the age of just 25, his poems continue to inspire generations who reinterpret and reinvent the ways in which we consume his work. John Keats died at an early age, leaving what have become some of the best-known English poems, such as "Ode to a Nightingale," "Ode to a Grecian Urn," "Ode to Melancholy" and "Ode to Autumn." In this biography of Keats, Stephen Hebron traces Keats' life and development as a poet, assessing his work in the context of the contemporary social and literary scene. After leaving school, Keats gained an apprenticeship to a surgeon and went on to qualify as an apothecary. But increasingly poetry dominated as his principal interest. He began to move in poetic and artistic circles, counting among his friends and acquaintances Leigh Hunt, Benjamin Haydon, Charles Lamb and Percy Bysshe Shelley and it was not long before his poetry was published regularly.
