While he was in seminary working on his M.Div. degree at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN, Pastor Tillerias also earned an M.A. degree in Islamic Studies. His Arabic teacher at the seminary was a Muslim psychologist from Egypt, and his tutor was a young Palestinian Muslim who grew up in Bethlehem.
