It was later adapted into the famed musical *Hello, Dolly!*

A work of startling originality when it debuted in 1938, Thornton Wilder's *Our Town* evolved to be seen by some as a vintage slice of early 20th Century Americana, rather than being fully appreciated for its complex and eternal themes and its deceptively simple form. This unique and timely book shines a light on the play's continued impact in the 21st century and makes a case for the healing powers of Wilder's text to a world confronting multiple crises. Through extensive interviews with more than 100 artists about their own experience of the play and its impact on them professionally and personally — and including background on the play's early years and its pervasiveness in American culture — *Another Day's Begun* shows why this particular work remains so important, essential, and beloved. Every production of *Our Town* has a story to tell beyond Wilder's own. One year after the tragedy of 9/11, Paul Newman, in his final stage appearance, played the Stage Manager in *Our Town* on Broadway. Director David Cromer's 2008 Chicago interpretation would play in five more cities, ultimately becoming New York's longest-running *Our Town* ever. In 2013, incarcerated men at Sing Sing Correctional Facility brought Grover's Corners inside a maximum security prison. After the 2017

arena bombing in Manchester UK, the Royal Exchange Theatre chose *Our Town* as its offering to the stricken community. 80 years after it was written, more than 110 years after its actions take place, *Our Town* continues to assert itself as an essential play about how we must embrace and appreciate the value of life itself. *Another Day's Begun* explains how this American classic has the power to inspire, heal and endure in the modern day, onstage and beyond.
