In 1960, *To Kill a Mockingbird* was published to critical acclaim. To commemorate *To Kill a Mockingbird*'s 50th anniversary, Michael J. These essays suggest that author Harper Lee deserves more credit for skillfully shaping a masterpiece that not only addresses the problems of the 1930s but also helps its readers see the problems and prejudices the world faces today. Intended for high school and undergraduate usage, as well as for teachers planning to use *To Kill a Mockingbird* in their classrooms, this collection will be a valuable resource for all teachers of American literature.
