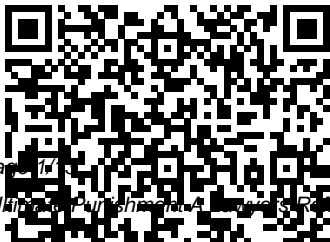

Ultimate Punishment A Lawyers Reflections On Dealing With The Death Penalty Scott Turow

Along the way, he provides a brief history of America's ambivalent relationship with the ultimate punishment, analyzes the potent reasons for and against it, including the role of the victims' survivors, and tells the powerful stories behind the statistics, as he moves from the Governor's Mansion to Illinois' state-of-the-art 'super-max' prison and the execution chamber.
