There are many reasons for pursuing a higher education. For most persons, a significant, maybe even the dominant reason, for going to college is that it supposedly will improve one's prospect of acquiring a good job. In a sense, a college degree has long been considered a ticket to

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the middle class--an adult life with a good income and relatively high job security. From the standpoint of society, efforts to expand college graduation attainment rates have been justified by President Obama and major foundations (for example, Lumina and Gates) on a need to be competitive with other nations which have a larger proportion of adults with college degrees. This study argues that the conventional wisdom that going to college is a "human capital investment" with a high payoff is increasingly wrong. Evidence shows that currently more than one-third of

college graduates hold jobs that governmental employment experts say would require less than a college degree. Moreover, the push to increase enrollments has led to a majority of the "increment" of the stock of college graduates finding employment in relatively low skilled jobs, most of which are not particularly high paying (although there are exceptions). If the public objective is to use higher education as a means to form human capital and expand national productive capabilities, it appears much of the recent "investment" in colleges is misdirected. The bottom line is that there is a need to rethink

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higher education policies, particularly the massive one-size-fits-all federal financial assistance programs but also other public provision of higher education services. (Contains 4 figures, 2 tables, and 2 footnotes.).

The history of financial assistance to students in high schools, colleges, and universities in this country underlies what the authors of this book see as a changing educational philosophy. From the founding of Harvard College in 1636, and its effort to provide employment for needy students, to money allocations made to land-grant colleges after the Civil War, and to the recent federal enactments, it is clear that there has been a shift from the concept of financial aid for only needy students to the

concept of work-study programs as an integral part of the total educational process.

This view is supported by the fact of current large federal appropriations for the development of such programs and by the fact that co-operative work-study programs have become a part of academic planning. A measure of the importance of this study may be derived from these figures: of the 7.6 million students in American universities and colleges at the present time, one in four participates in federally-financed aid programs; of the 2,242 million dollars in student aid granted in 1967, 70 percent came from the federal government in the form of work-study programs, outright grants, loans, and scholarships; and in large universities, from one-fourth to one-half of all students receive some sort of financial assistance. An important part of this work are

In addition, the authors' conclusions and recommendations for structuring work-study programs will be valuable to administrators, counselors, and educators in general.

Yet, the long-term structural changes accelerated by the cyclical impact of the Great Recession have resulted in a very unequal recovery. During the recession, the worst economic downturn since the Great Depression, workers without postsecondary education suffered tremendous job losses. The recovery has been virtually nonexistent for less-educated workers. Men without a college degree were traditionally able to make their way into the middle class through manufacturing and construction jobs, and women without a college degree could get middle class jobs in office and administrative support occupations. These pathways are increasingly closing down,

leaving few opportunities to access the middle class without postsecondary education. By contrast, for most workers with a Bachelor's degree or higher, the recovery has resulted in a strong job market. These recent economic trends have made it clearer than ever that a college degree continues to be the most important economic asset for those who want to succeed in the labor market. The economy is seeing a continuing scouring out of low-skill jobs in favor of high-skill jobs. This makes the acquisition of postsecondary education an essential prerequisite to participate in the 21st century labor market. Workers with a high school diploma or less must attain postsecondary credentials if they want to compete effectively in growing high-skill career fields. The nation must face up to a need to train more of its workers for the growing high-skill jobs that play an

This research, undertaken between 2004 and 2010, examines the progress of a single cohort of students on an undergraduate degree - the B.A. Educational Studies - at the University of Hull. It investigates their entry profiles, their progress on the degree and the impact their studies have had on their postgraduate lives. The research has been informed by a range of literature, most notably that of Archer et al. (2003), Thomas (2001), Wolf (2002) and Connor et al. (2006), in its examination of the policy and values underpinning

education as a force for economic growth; widening participation; the impact of family background in relation to education; and the links between vocational and academic entry routes to higher education. The research has been set within a series of policy and value contexts, moving from the global to the national and finally to the local. The research combines quantitative and qualitative methods to investigate an overarching research question: How does the performance and experience of students on a B.A. Educational Studies degree relate to their prior qualifications and background? This has been done through an examination of seven key sub-questions: 1. What kinds of students are enrolled for an

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Educational Studies degree at Hull. Applicants from the University of Hull? 2. Why do students apply to do an Educational Studies degree at the University of Hull? 3. Whom do Hull University admissions staff admit to an Educational Studies degree? 4. How do these students perform on the degree? 5. Do students with different entry profiles perform differently on the degree? 6. What are the students' eventual ambitions? Do these change, or stay the same? If they change, what leads to this? 7. How beneficial have the students' pre-university experiences been in preparing them for undergraduate study, postgraduate study/work? The outcome of the research shows that the students are predominantly young and female, living in or near to traditional academic entry routes were accepted with a wider range of UCAS points than students from vocational entry routes, but both groups fared equally well on the degree, whatever the nature of their pre-entry qualifications or whichever subjects they studied beforehand. Mature students, in general, had higher achievement rates on the degree than younger students. In their early postgraduate lives, the students themselves perceived their pre-entry qualifications as having provided little benefit in preparing them for their undergraduate studies, but those with vocational qualifications had found these useful in their postgraduate studies and working lives. Later

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interviews suggested that these perceptions began to change once the former students were settled in careers. From the research, it emerges that - outwith the nature of students" entry qualifications - family background and teacher expectations have importance in determining the students" reasons for entering higher education. In addition, one of the most significant factors in their successfully gaining graduate jobs appears to have been students" access to work experience both before coming to university and during their time as undergraduates. The sample interviewed three years after graduation was able to reflect on their degree studies as having been a positive and personally fulfilling experience, a finding that
