The book is not a mathematical text, and there are no assigned exercises or exams. It is written for reasonably intelligent and

curious individuals, both those who value mathematics, aware of its many important applications and others who have been inappropriately exposed to mathematics, leading to indifference to the subject, fear and even loathing. The fundamental theorem of algebra states that any complex polynomial must have a complex root.
