Women in the Workplace: How We Work | The Wall Street Journal

The average American spent 3 hours and 32 minutes a day working or commuting to work last year, including weekends. That's down from 3 hours and 42 minutes in 2005 and is four minutes less than in 2014.. Meanwhile, Americans slept an average of 8 hours and 50 minutes a day in 2015, 13 minutes more than a decade earlier and two minutes more than in 2014.
