Never satisfied to simply tell a story—with writing that is "layered and interwoven... understanding that perspective is various, varied" (The New Statesman)—Wideman continues to push form, with stories within stories, sentences that rise like a jazz solo with every connecting clause, voices that reflect who he is and where he's from, and an exploration of time that entangles past and present.
