In quiet retreats for prayer, in the noisy exercises of Protestant revivalism, in the mystical pursuit of the voices of angels, Christians have listened for a divine call. But what happened when the ear tuned to God Ós voice found itself under the inspection of Enlightenment critics? The mystic Ós ear was hardly lost, but it was now marked deeply with imposture and illusion.

Her fate, so long dictated by family loyalty and tradition, is now tied to the changing fortunes of her country.
