Compassionate and humorous, the grace and

style of Shepherd's prose is heightened by a superb ear for the vigorous language of the north-east. *The Weatherhouse*, Shepherd's masterpiece, is an even more substantial achievement which belongs to the great line of Scottish fiction dealing with the complex interactions of small communities, and especially the community of women - a touching and hilarious network of mothers, daughters, spinsters and widows. It is also a striking meditation on the nature of truth, the power of human longing and the mystery of being.
