But primary sources can also include photographs, paintings, sculpture, architecture, oral interviews, statistical tables, and even geography. A thorough reading of secondary sources will equip the researcher with a sense of interpretation. Needful is it to say that one should not rely upon one secondary source, but to always incorpo
